St. Andrew's is in a time of transition, and change is inevitable. A serious self examination is going to be required so we, as a parish, can determine how we see ourselves, and how we want other people to see us. We have secured an interim priest to help guide us through this process. She is not new to parish work and her experience means she does not need a long time to come up to speed with our family.

The next couple of months will see meetings with Ellen Ekevag, the commissioning of the Transition Committee, and the starting of meetings upon meetings upon meetings to discuss and deliberate the answers to the questions of who we are and where we see ourselves in the future, as well as a path to take us there will be discussed at length.

Increasing our population is a goal. Broadening our age range is another. What can we do to move toward those goals? Thanks to a dedicated group we have an established church school program. - Additional meetings with small groups (general membership).

Back Benching is discouraged.

- Fully active participation is necessary by all members.
- All views need to be expressed and discussed.
- Be open to other ideas without shutting down.

Constant communication (over communicate).

- Ellen Ekevag's number will probably be on everybody's speed dial.
- Vestry will be kept informed of all decisions.
- Status of Transition Team and not detail of what is being discussed.
- Some information must remain confidential and is only for Transition Team
- and Vestry
